well as the Chairman of the Arizona House Education Committee. But, he never thought he was going to be involved in politics.

“That [politics] was the last thing I ever imagined doing,” Boyer says. “I thought I was either going to be a journalist or a pastor.”

Mr. Boyer is considering running for the State Senate, but is quite pleased with where he is now.

“I really believe that I can do and have done a lot of good in my time at the state legislature and until I think otherwise I am going to continue there,” Boyer says. “More importantly, I love teaching here. This is my love and the legislature is my labor.”

Mr. Boyer came into the Great Hearts community with the intention of receiving a communications job. However, the Arizona Constitution states that an elected official cannot also act as a city, state, or county employee at the same time. There is one exception- to be a teacher.

“I brought in the Arizona Constitution to my interview and stated that 51 percent of my job has to be teaching,” he says. “They offered me a position to teach and I loved teaching so much that I never decided to even try the communications job.”

Mr. Boyer relates the challenges of teaching to Plato’s Republic, when Socrates discusses the art of *techne*, to get the students to turn towards being.

“How do you get a class of 20-25 students to desire and want to learn? You want students to write well, to think well, to speak well through the discussion of great texts. Getting them [students] to love learning as much as you do- that’s hard.”

Although there are many challenging aspects of teaching, Mr. Boyer says when those goals are fulfilled, that is the most rewarding part.

“When you see the lightbulb and it actually clicks with

a student and you can see it on their face- either when they are excited about something in history or a passage in *The Republic*-that’s pretty cool,” he says with a smile.

Even though Mr. Boyer loves to spend his free time outdoors, specifically rock climbing and hiking the Grand Canyon, having done rim-to-rim six times, his true passion is reading.

“I am always reading something. In fact, I went to a boxing match the other night and everyone made fun of me because I brought Cicero’s *On Duties*,” Boyer says. “I love talking about good ideas- it’s not just here at Veritas, but outside here too.”
